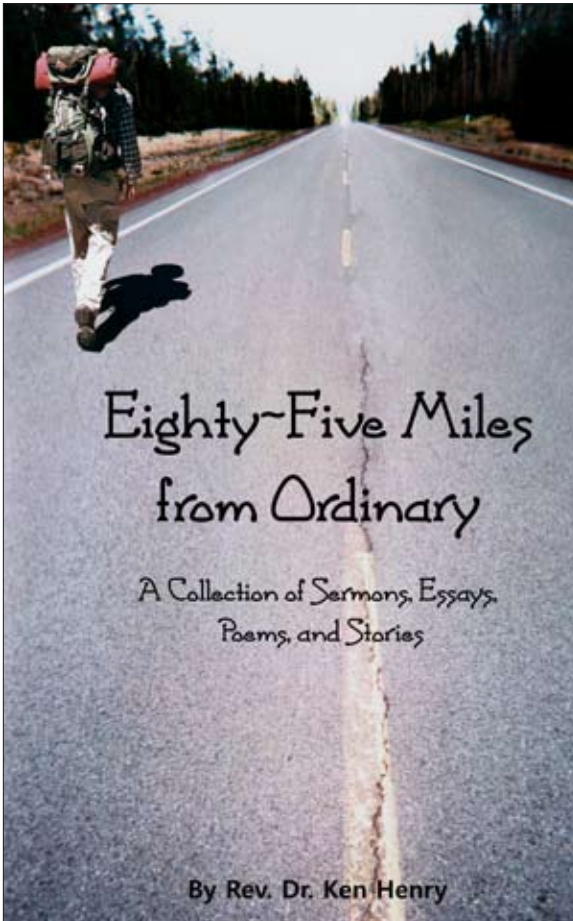

KEN HENRY PUBLISHES SECOND BOOK, "EIGHTY-FIVE MILES FROM ORDINARY"

Imagine attending Worship at your local Presbyterian church and, after being seated in your favorite pew, listening to a sermon based on Shakespeare's *Richard III*, or, as you're perusing the bulletin, noticing that John Muir is the guest preacher that morning.

How about hearing a sermon based on Hollywood's portrayal of Jesus in the movies, or, as a congregation, reflecting on the artistic work of William Blake?

Imagine coming to hear a sermon each week and never knowing what to expect.

In his newest book, *Eighty-Five Miles from Ordinary: A Collection of Sermons, Essays, Poems, and Stories*, the Rev. Dr. Ken Henry shares a collection of innovative approaches to preaching and storytelling.

All of the sermons in the book were preached at Stone between 2007 and 2011. In addition, the book offers a series of essays, stories and poems. These writings have come from Ken's many years of leading congregations to reflect more deeply on their relationship with God, as well as to explore creative expressions in spiritual growth.

On Saturday, Nov. 26 (from 10 am to noon) and on Sunday, Nov. 27 (from 10:30 am to noon), Ken will sign copies of his new book in the Social Hall, as part of the *Triennial Art Exhibit of Lynden Keith Johnson*, who designed the book's cover (see page 8 for more about the exhibit).

The purchase price of the book is \$16, and 10% of all proceeds will be donated to Stone Church.

Nov. 6: “Green Dialogues” with Alison van Diggelen

Alison van Diggelen, host of *Fresh Dialogues*, an interview series featuring green entrepreneurs and experts, will discuss the significant work being done by some of Silicon Valley’s green companies, including Google, Adobe, and Bloom Energy. She will also share green practices you can adopt at home and in your workplace to lower your carbon footprint.

Nov. 13 & 20: “Handel’s Messiah”

We will hear, see, and study Handel’s *Messiah*, listening to the sublime music, as well as reviewing the scriptural quotes that form the libretto. This beloved

oratorio was originally performed by fewer than forty instrumentalists and thirty boy trebles and men. To this tradition Christopher Hogwood, the Academy of Ancient Music, and the Choir of Westminster have returned.

Nov. 27: “Alternative Gifts for the Holidays” with Rosaleen Zisch

Due to the commercial atmosphere, Christmas gift giving can be a burden rather than a pleasure. The message of Christ’s birth can get overshadowed. Come to learn about gifts that inspire and offer opportunities to many families around the world.

Dec. 4: “Envision San Jose 2040” with Kim Walesh

Kim Walesh is the Chief Strategist for the City of San José. She will outline the *Draft 2040 Plan*, which will guide the city’s continued growth through the year 2040.

Dec. 11: “The Power of Story: How Our Stories of Christmas Enhance, Distract or Draw Us Closer to the Story of Jesus’ Birth” with Ken Henry

Ken will invite class members to share their personal stories and experiences of Christmas and explore the theological significance of storytelling.

Dec. 18: “The Symbols of Christmas - An Expanded View” with Sue Williams

The wonderful symbols on our Chrismon tree (manger, star, staff, cornerstone, etc.) carry meanings that go far beyond our traditional awareness. The stories of Jesus’ birth are also rich in symbols that include characters, names, actions, words, objects and literary forms. Because of the work of scholars, symbols are well understood today.

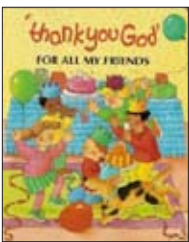

Hello friends!

After completing our performances of the *Beatitude Mass*, the Chancel Choir now turns to the joy of presenting music for Advent and Christmas.

Along with our Children's and Handbell Choirs, this year we will celebrate music from many international traditions!

You can look forward to these highlights of the Advent and Christmas season, featuring *Christmas songs from around the world!*

First Sunday of Advent: We welcome the season with American composer Pepper Choplin's setting of *I hear the prophet callin*, as well as the majestic *There Shall a Star Come Out of Jacob* and *Lo how a rose e'er blooming* by German composers Felix Mendelssohn and Michael Praetorius.

Second Sunday of Advent: With the Children's Choir, we will sing *African Noel* and the spiritual, *Go tell it on the mountain*.

Third Sunday of Advent: Joyeux Noel! The Chancel Choir celebrates a French Christmas this year on the third Sunday of Advent with our major work, Marc-Antoine Charpentier's *Song of the Birth of our Lord Jesus Christ*, a lovely pastoral setting for chorus, soloists and strings. Interspersed with the cantata will be familiar French Christmas carols, including *Bring a*

Torch, Jeannette, Isabelle (attributed to Charpentier), *Angels we have heard on high, Angels from the Realms of Glory* and *Ding Dong Merrily on High*.

Fourth Sunday of Advent: O great mystery! We sing this week settings of *O magnum mysterium* by Spanish composer Tomas Victoria and American Morton Lauridsen.

Christmas Eve, 11 pm service: The Welsh lullaby, *Suo Gan*, will be featured, along with the setting of the words of Simeon, *Nunc Dimittus*, by Russian composer Alexander Gretchaninoff.

Christmas Day, 9:30 am: The Chancel Choir presents English composer Gustav Holst's medley of Christmas Carols, *Christmas Day, Merry Christmas!*

New Year's Day, 9:30 am: Karen Kirk Thielen brings her beautiful harps to celebrate the first day of the New Year. Happy New Year!

STONE'S SESSION MUST DEAL WITH BURGEONING CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS

The Stone Church Session held its regular meeting on Oct. 18, 2011.

Session authorized baptism of Evy Ann Mattan, child of Jeffrey and Kim Mattan, on Oct. 23. This is the eighth baptism of a child at Stone in 2011. There were ten child baptisms in 2010.

The above statistics help to explain a report from Deborah Crim on Christian Education, which brought the good news/bad news that the Church Nursery and Church School are outgrowing their space. There is a legal prohibition against putting the youngest children into rooms downstairs. Session members agreed to think about possible solutions

and to come back in November for a focused discussion.

Deborah also praised the work of Peggy Spool in teaching music to the children.

A new midweek children's play program starts Nov. 8. It goes from 10 am to noon on Tuesday mornings twice a month. It is designed to give parents a chance to connect in a less structured setting (*see also page 2*).

Members rejoiced with Ken Henry that he and his family have finally found a permanent house.

Session members were reminded that all officers and all who work with children are required to take Safe Church training. The church as an

institution has a legal and a moral responsibility to be aware of potential abuse and to know how to respond in the event that any abuse occurs.

Mel Goertz reported that to date 58 people had given or pledged \$140,000 for the *Moving Forward* campaign. He also told about a memorial gift given by the children of Audrey and Lowell Clark. Session received the gift with thanks and agreed to allocate \$4,000 to the *Moving Forward* campaign, \$1,000 to the music special fund, and \$1,000 to Presbyterian Women. Music at Stone Church held special meaning for Lowell, and Audrey was fully involved with PW.
