The Second Lesson

John 2: 13-25 (N.T., p. 93)

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money-changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, 'Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a market-place!' His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.' The Jews then said to him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?' Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews then said, 'This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

When he was in Jerusalem during the Passover festival, many believed in his name because they saw the signs that he was doing. But Jesus on his part would not entrust himself to them, because he knew all people and needed no one to testify about anyone; for he himself knew what was in everyone.

<u>Welcome Guests and Visitors!</u> We hope you already feel at home among us here at Stone Church. The nearest **restroom** is located between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall; exit thru the double doors at the front of the Sanctuary (near the TV). Everyone is invited for **refreshments** and fellowship in the Social Hall and on the patio after worship. We welcome the sound of any little ones during worship, but if your baby (age 0-3) gets too wiggly for you, you may take them to the **Nursery**, located in the hallway between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall. It's open each Sunday for children ages 0-3.

<u>Children's Church School</u> – Children meet in the Fireside Room at 9:30 am (stone building on the other side of the Social Hall). Children will come to the sanctuary to participate in Communion.

<u>Each Week, Stone Church Invites You to Share Holy Communion</u> - We use the intinction method, dipping the bread in the cup—amber is juice, dark red is wine. When the time comes, we will process down the center aisle; take bread (in cup or cut – gluten free avail) and dip; the server will say a few words; partake of the moistened bread; return to your seat by the side aisles.

<u>Today the Unity Candle</u> is at an unknown location somewhere in the San Jose Presbytery. Each week this unity candle travels to a different church, and since the information was not available at print time, please pray for all God's people in our Presbytery.

A Message from our Choir Director - Nancy Kromm

Today's music spans genres and styles.

The **Introit** anthem is by the renowned British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams, which asks God to "proper our handiwork", and quotes a setting of one refrain of "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" at the end, during which you are welcome to join in.

The lively **Anthem** "Shepherd Me, Lord" was written by German American Gershon Kingsley, a noted composer of EDM (electronic dance music), a pioneer of that genre and of the Moog Synthesizer. His song, "Popcorn," was the first EDM track, from 1969. Our anthem also dates from that period and Gershon said his aim was to bring classical and pop music together.

The choir joins the Easton family in today's final hymn, "Establish the work of our hands," which brings us full circle from Vaughan Williams' text, "oh prosper thou our handiwork."

<u>Women's Retreat</u> – April 4-6 is our annual retreat at the St. Francis Retreat Center in San Juan Bautista. This year, member Alice McNelis will lead us deeper into *The Science of Compassion*. We'll widen our understanding of compassion and engage in practices that cultivate strength and joy, building resilience together.

Alice received her BS in Neuroscience and Behavior, and MS in Physical Therapy. Recently she's finished a year of training to be an Ambassador of Compassion through Stanford Medicine's Applied Compassion Training!

There will be small group discussions, and as always, this will be a fun relaxing weekend that includes Saturday crafts, hikes, and free time to rest and roam. <u>Scholarships</u> are available; so please do not let the cost deter you; requests are handled discreetly.

<u>Donate Food Next Sunday</u> – The First Sunday of the month, we collect and donate food for Sacred Heart Community Services. **Next week** we'll have our collection baskets in the Narthex to gather donated food/goods. Consider bringing one of these: pop-top cans and other packaged food items (no homemade food); gently used or new blankets and linens; hygiene items of unopened toothpaste, shampoo, deodorant, toothbrushes, etc.; diapers (both infant and adult); unopened infant formula; new socks, and new underwear for men, women and children; and gently used or new sleeping bags.

STOP Human Trafficking! - Take action and stand with us as we call attention to human trafficking by standing with our signs on Lincoln Ave. Human trafficking is the recruitment, transport or transfer of persons using force, fraud or coercion to exploit them for acts of labor or sex.
