

<u>Welcome Guests and Visitors!</u> We hope you already feel at home among us here at Stone Church. The nearest **restroom** is located between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall; exit thru the double doors at the front of the Sanctuary (near the TV). Everyone is invited for **refreshments** and fellowship in the Social Hall and on the patio after worship. We welcome the sound of any little ones during worship, but if your baby (age 0-3) gets too wiggly for you, you may take them to the **Nursery**, located in the hallway between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall. It's open each Sunday for children ages 0-3.

<u>Children's Church School</u> – Children meet in the Fireside Room (stone building on the other side of the Social Hall). Children will come to the sanctuary to participate in Communion.

<u>Each Week, Stone Church Invites You</u> to share Holy Communion. We use the intinction method, dipping the bread in the cup—amber is juice, dark red is wine. When the time comes, we will process down the center aisle; take bread (in cup or cut – gluten free avail) and dip; the server will say a few words; partake of the moistened bread; return to your seat by the side aisles.

<u>October Adult Ed</u> - (11am SA) – **Today**, Rev. Sharon LeClaire will have a discussion on grief. All of us go through our grief work at some time in our lives. She'll talk about grief as it is in our culture and scripture, with time for questions and sharing.

<u>First Sunday SHCS Donations</u> – **Today**, the First Sunday of the month, we collect and donate items for Sacred Heart Community Services. Our food & goods collection baskets are available in the Narthex to gather donated items. If you missed bringing something today, consider bringing some of these items next month - pop-top cans and other packaged food items (no homemade food); gently used or new blankets and linens; hygiene items of unopened toothpaste, shampoo, deodorant, toothbrushes, etc.; diapers (both infant and adult); unopened infant formula; new socks, new underwear for men, women and children; and gently used or new sleeping bags.

<u>Glory to God Hymnals</u> - Back in 2004 the PCUSA authorized research into creating a new hymnal, and in 2008 they formed a committee to study other denominations' hymnals, global music, and contemporary trends. This committee anonymously reviewed new submissions and selected hymns based on various factors, including hymns that addressed new topics or filled gaps. This new PCUSA hymnal, *Glory to God*, was published in 2013.

Stone looked into purchasing a set of these new hymnals. Based on the small selection of sample hymns provided by the PCUSA, the committee decided not to purchase at that time.

Fast forward to today: many of the Glory to God hymns are preferred by pastors, and so, are used each week during worship. Without the actual hymnals, the songs are printed as separate inserts; so to simplify, save paper, and declutter the bulletins, the Worship Committee voted unanimously to submit a hymnal purchase proposal to Session, which was approved in September.

The hymnals have been ordered, and over the next few weeks they will be added to the pews in addition to our blue hymnals.

The Glory to God Hymnal includes:

- ★ Over 800 hymns, psalms, and spiritual songs.
- ★ Approximately 50% of the hymns are from the blue 1990 Presbyterian hymnal. The remaining pieces are from former Presbyterian hymnals, other denominational song-books, and individual authors and composers.

- ★ A musical setting of almost every Lectionary psalm.
- ★ Music from six different continents.
- ★ Music covering all major historical and contemporary sacred genres, including approx. thirty-five African American/Gospel hymns.

<u>The Peace and Global Witness Offering</u> will be taken today; an envelope is provided in your bulletin. Your gift enables our denomination, the Presbyterian Church (USA), to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world.

Individual congregations are encouraged to use up to 25% of this offering for peacemaking efforts that align with their passion. This year our Stone Works Committee voted to send our portion to Covenant Presbyterian Church (PCUSA) in Springfield, Ohio. They are a welcoming, affirming congregation (whose Pastor went to McCormick Seminary with Rev Irene Pak Lee) of people from all over the United States, Haiti, Ukraine, Central and South America. Their city has been made more dangerous by political rhetoric, so our donation will be used by their mission committee to support efforts toward local peace.

<u>Hurricane Helene Relief</u> - Presbyterian Disaster Assistance offers a way for us to quickly provide relief (over time) to those impacted by disasters. The dangerous category 4 hurricane Helene caused devastating damage and loss of life in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, and Tennessee. With the storm surge, wind damage, and flooding, it is crucial to have the necessary resources to support the many communities that are affected. Your generous gifts will bring hope and encouragement.

PDA is in communication with all affected presbyteries and National VOAD (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster) to share information and coordinate resources as damage is assessed.
